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Kingsport officer arrested on sealed federal indictment, resigns from force

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KINGSPORT, Tenn. - A federal indictment originating in Louisiana has prompted the arrest and resignation of a Kingsport police officer.

On Friday Richard Chandler was booked into the Washington County Detention Center in Jonesborough, Tenn. He remained jailed at the facility Tuesday, with Kingsport Police Department Deputy Chief Dale Phipps reporting Chandler resigned the day of his arrest.

Gregory Bowman, Assistant U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of Tennessee, says he's familiar with the case, but could not comment on specifics as the indictment is sealed. He added Chandler is the only Northeast Tennessee man arrested through the indictment, which was filed in the U.S. District Court's Western District of Louisiana.

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
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
