

## Former Tulsa police officer Jeff Henderson's conviction upheld on appeal

The 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals on Thursday upheld the conviction of a former Tulsa police officer who has completed his prison term for perjury and civil rights violations.

Jeff Henderson is one of four officers who were convicted as a result of an investigation into police corruption.

At least 48 people have been freed from prison or had their cases modified because of civil rights violations or potential problems with their cases stemming from the police corruption, according to previous Tulsa World stories.

At least 17 lawsuits have been filed against the city and individual police officers as a result.

Henderson had been charged in a 62-count indictment, a number that was whittled to 54 counts by the time he faced trial in 2011.

A judge dismissed one count and jurors acquitted Henderson of 45 counts, leaving him to be convicted on six counts of perjury and two counts of violating civil rights.

He served a 42-month prison sentence before being released last year, which included time already served in jail before his conviction.

According to the 30-page order and judgment released Thursday, Henderson objected to his conviction on four grounds, listed on page 17 of the document.
